

The Elgin Eco Association will be holding its annual general meeting on May 2 starting at 7pm. Summer camp registrations will also take place that evening. Camp registration is on a first come first served basis. You can also register online when our facebook page goes online. The price for camp is \$50 per child for members, and \$100 for non-members.

As this is our 21st year we will be discussing, what our next steps are. The EEA started because the Elgin school was shut down. It was the center of the community. The founders of the EEA felt that we needed another gathering place. They purchased a field in the middle of Elgin, and from there we have built a beautiful park for our community to meet.

To build a park you need money. To make money, so we needed a fundraiser. The Elgin Mountain Bike Race was created to fill this need. To have a race you need trails. It has continued to snowball from there. There is now a large trail system maintained by the EEA that can be used year round. Because the EEA is also about getting out into nature. We have also worked very hard to save the Mapleton Preserve trail from being clear cut. Because of this work the Mapleton Preserve trail is here for people to enjoy. Summer camp has introduced the children in the area to the joy of being outside. With all that being said, where do we go next?

Members and future members come on out to the AGM to help us decide what our future is going to look like. If you see the value this organization has created and feel you can contribute, don't hesitate to put your name down to become an officer on the board, be a committee member, or just volunteer to lend a hand at one of our events. Small contributions go a long way to helping a community, and if we want things to be better it is up to us!

The bike trails are open. Please be cautious when riding. The trails have not all been blown off and cleaned up. Walkers please be aware that riders have the right away. We are excited to announce that we are going to hire a summer student this year. This student will be hired under the Canada Summer Job program. Job Description This student would be hired to maintain our existing network of multi-use trails in the community. This will be a 280 hour job with flexible work hours. The person will be responsible for removing and clearing trees and other debris. Construct new trails and/or features as directed by the trail supervisor. Repair damaged bike trails due to erosion and rider use. Operate brush saws, and pole saws. Qualifications: an interest in mountain biking, knowledge of trail building techniques, self motivated,

ability to work with basic hand tools, such as shovels and rakes, access to a four wheeler required. They will be asked to report on the progress of each task and offer possible improvements to their supervisor. Please send resume to elgineconb@gmail.com Deadline for applications is May 3rd.

In addition to the bike trails is a new year to enjoy the popular Mapleton Acadian Forest hiking trail! After the long winter, the trees that blocked the trail, and the precarious hanging trees have been removed by volunteer members François Desrochers and JoAnn Ball. At the time of writing the trail was still snow covered due to its higher elevation and also very wet in places, though each day it clears a little more. A new bridge was to be installed last fall, but due to the changed of staff at Nature Trust this did not happen, hopefully it will happen this year.

As soon as we enter the month of May we hear the return of many species of birds to the forest around the trail. The Acadian Forest offers ample opportunity for many birds to find nesting spots. It is part of the life cycle of the forest that large trees fall, these areas of blown down trees create light in places that once were dark, and seedlings that have been waiting, sometimes for several years, are quick to shoot up and replace the fallen mature trees. The fallen trees create a safe space not only for birds and small creatures, but also slower growing species of trees enjoy the tangle of branches. While not always a beautiful sight, fallen trees also act as a nursery keeping seedlings safe until they are big enough to share some of their nutrients with a hungry deer in search of a snack.

Early May we will organize a trail clean up. We will need volunteers to help with some popping and pruning of branches. It takes very little time for the branches to spread out and narrow the trail. If you would like to be a part of protecting this little piece of the Acadian Forest, please check Facebook for dates and come help us on the trail.

The Mapleton Acadian Trail is situated on Route 895 just over 4km from the junction of Route 905 and 895 between Petitcodiac and Elgin.

After our AGM May 2nd the next regular meeting will be June 6 at the Women's Institute Hall.





The History of the Tingley Farm - Part 1 of 2 Written by Marlene Hickman

Farm on the Colpitts Road, Colpitts Settlement, is based on stories collected from Jim Tingley, told to and recorded by his daughter Marlene in the 1990s. It is difficult to tell the story of a farm without also telling the story of the farmer who dedicated his life to it. So this is a story of the man - and the farm.

At the tender age of not quite 3, in 1921, James (Jim) Tingley moved from Lewisville to the farm in Colpitts Settlement where he would live for the next 66 years. His parents, Art and Eliza Tingley, decided they wanted to raise their growing family in the country and chose the farm formerly owned by two Colpitts families. Their oldest child Earl was 13, Irene 12, Bertha 10, Eddie 9, Vera 7, James 2 1/2, and Frank, not yet one year old. Their last child, Douglas, was born on the farm in 1923.

The family packed their belongings into the only car that Art ever owned - a 1919 Model T Ford Touring Car. The rest of were piled on a wagon drawn by their old Clydesdale horse, Dick. A cow was tied to the back. The first night in their new home, the family slept on the floor. It was a large house, a double house designed to house two families. It had two kitchens, a shared pantry, two livingrooms and a bedroom on the main floor. Upstairs there were five bedrooms. A large fruit orchard grew in front and another in the back field some distance from the house. They grew cherries, plums, and a large variety of apples. It is possible the previous owners had purchased their trees from the Tingley tree nursery located in Crooked Creek, Albert County, a large operation whose owner, Agreen Tingley, was a distant cousin of Art. At one time, a mill operated on the brook behind the farm, but ruins and only the dam remained.

Art Tingley continued his work as a "spare" fireman for the railway. Except for those times when he was laid off, he was away from home for days at a time, leaving his sons to help their mother with the farm chores. Like many

decided to raise foxes for extra income. Using her husband's train pass, she travelled to Montreal to sell the pelts.

1933 was a tragic year. Nine year old Douglas died of pneumonia. A few short months later, the original house on the farm burned. The family sheltered in another building on the farm while they struggled to rebuild on the old foundation. Jim had been getting up early each morning to do the chores, then jogged the two miles to school. At the end of each day he would turn the cattle out to water, clean the stable, and whatever else needed doing. At age 15, in 1933, Jim decided he was needed at home and guit school. He continued to rise early each morning to do farm chores, before joining his brother Earl and brothers-in-law Murray McFarlane and Steven Hopper to cut lumber from woodland Eliza had purchased, returning home each night to do it all again. Eventually, an unfinished shell of a house was built.

The two barns on the farm needed repairs. In 1939, Jim and Art cut logs to expand one of the barns, adding a hip roof, with the help of Art's brother Percy. Jim's older brother Eddie helped when he could, but he eventually enlisted and went off to war. Youngest


This history of the Tingley of her neighbours in the 1920s, Eliza brother Frank was in Normal School training to be a teacher and he joined the Airforce. The older children had married and left the farm.

> In 1940, Jim's mother lost her battle with breast cancer, and Jim found himself alone on the farm much of the time. November of that year he brought his new bride, Ivy Mesheau, home to the farm and they began their life together. Art was boarding in Moncton, close to his work and visited the farm when he could. Four years later, Art married Hazel Crandall and moved to her home in Salisbury.

> The early years of Jim and Ivy's marriage were challenging. They started with seven cows, ten calves, some hens and pigs. They improved the farm and finished the house, installing electricity and plumbing. They also needed to find ways to generate a cash flow to feed their growing family. They sold or bartered potatoes, carrots, apples, butter, eggs and whatever else they had to local stores. In the fall, they butchered pigs and cows to hang in the barn for winter meat. They also made head cheese, barrels of sauerkraut and salt pork.

Mothers Day by Gloria Scribner

Once upon a Mothers Day Long ago and far away I was just a child at play But "you" were always "Mother"

As a child in the 40's my earliest memory of Mother's Day was the entourage of family arriving in droves women heading straight upstairs to the spare room to lay their coats on the bed and do a final check in the bedroom mirror before heading down to the parlour to present the "lacy be-ribboned" Mother's Day cards to My "Mama". The men, in their Sunday shirts and shiny shoes, hung their hats on the moose-antlers in the entryway.

It seemed then as it does now that "Mama" worked more on Mother's Day than any other day. Preparing dinner and greeting her guests. Reading cards and shuffling plants on the windowsills to make room for a few more.

If she did get a chance to sit down, the lazy cat jumped onto her lap (if I didn't get there first).

The children presented their bouquets to "Grandma" and hugs and kisses were abundant. Little girls wore their Sunday best and boys were perfect little gentlemen (until after dinner when with crumbs still on their faces headed outside to play with cousins).

Mothers Moms On Dav. everywhere were "Queens for a Day" and when evening came and quiet came down she pondered on the precious ones who made her a "Mama".

On any given day her world consisted of sights, sounds, and smells that repeat themselves in memory even now as I remember the warmth of her early morning rituals of fire starting, breakfast cooking. Morning sounds of rooster crowing, hungry hens clucking, as she gathered the eggs.

I remember the smells of her

rose sachet, peppermints, and lilacs in the vase. I can see in my mind's eye the Monday morning wash flapping on the line under push-pegs and even spread on the grass, smelling of lye soap, javex, and country sunshine. The springtime house smelled of Bon Ami, Mule-team Borax, wallpaper paste, and lemon oil.

I hear laughter ringing o'er the years as I remember 2 boys lying bellydown on the parlour rug reading the comic strip pages of the Family Herald or the Free Press Weekly; I hear the clicking of knitting needles and the hum of an old song I'd heard her playing on the parlour organ. I hear the treadle of the Singer sewing machine, and coming through the springtime air, the whine of the wood-cutter while she cooked dinner for the crew.

Mama laughed often, but she cried a lot too. She cried when she was happy, or when she was sad. She cried at weddings, funerals, good-byes, and unkind outbursts from those she loved. She laughed at funny songs, antics of her family, and even herself at times, and because she was ticklish (and Daddy knew it).

She read her Bible a lot and prayed a lot, especially if one of us was sad, or broken hearted, or "if she was".

Her favourite things were new babies, bread coming out of a hot oven, and a batch of deep yellow butter in the springtime when the cows were out on the new grass. She loved the sound of the "Midnight Special" bringing her darlings home, the summer hail beating against the windowpane, and dancing on the lane. She loved "mail days" when post cards read "Somewhere in Europe" and nephews remembered her.

But most of all she loved those memories of her own "Mother" and the love that she passed on to all the daughters and sons who remember "Mama".



From the Desk of Your MLA **Ross Wetmore, Gagetown - Petitcodiac** As the seasons change, so do fighters. When they are not dealing with

the concerns of our first responders, particularly fire fighters along with search and rescue personnel. As flood season gives way to forest fire season, we are reminded that we cannot prevent floods, but we can prevent some forest fires. We cannot stop Mother Nature from hurling lightning bolts into tinder dry forests, but we can do everything possible to ensure we don't set the woods ablaze through human activity.

You will recall the forest fires in the St. Andrew's area at the end of May last year. 500 hectares of forest burned, and one home was lost. An ATV fire in the woods was identified as the cause. I would not presume to suggest this fire was preventable, but it serves to remind us to keep our equipment in top form and to consider carrying fire suppression when we venture into New Brunswick's forests. A small fire extinguisher could make all the difference. When building a campfire, it's worth remembering what some Scout leaders once taught: the first thing to consider when building a fire is how it will be extinguished.

We are very fortunate in New Brunswick to have a regiment of welltrained and dedicated

our own wildfires, they are travelling across Canada and around the world to help when and where they are needed. Last year, our New Brunswickers helped battle fires in Alberta, in an arrangement that works both ways. If we ever need them, and we hope and pray we don't, other provinces stand ready to help us fight forest fires.

April 16th was the official first day of wildfire season and people are being reminded to check burning conditions before lighting any fires and to take action to protect their property. This includes moving wood piles away from homes, clearing brush from around their properties, and removing debris from gutters and roofs. Our woodlands suffered 209 wildfires last year, which is down from the ten-year average of 246. With luck, this year, we can keep the number below average and perhaps set a record for fewest fires. Here's hoping.

It is hard to believe our next communication will be the annual congratulations for our graduates. It seems time doesn't just fly; it flies at the speed of light.

Thank you for your continued forest-fire kindness and support.




Touch-a-Tractor

Agriculture History in the Salisbury Region (Written by Reginald Lewis)

Agriculture in Salisbury area prior to World War II (1939-1945) provided a large part of the economy to the local region. A great number of families were raised on farms and supplied employment for many people.

The Town will be piloting a new made-in-

Salisbury grant program intended to assist youth living within our municipal boundaries access and cover costs related to their recreation program(s). From hockey and baseball to dance classes and summer camp and everything in between, the Town knows that Salisbury's youth live up to the title of being Canada's Most Active Community. But unfortunately, costs for both registration and equipment can be a barrier to ensuring that everyone has an equal chance to participate in this type of programming.

Applications for FAR will be accepted at different times per year, based on the stream you are applying for and program you wish to participate in. Maple Syrup

The following was written by Connie Colpitts, a Salisbury 250 Committee member, with credit to the NB Maple Syrup Association and, Debora Carr, Connecting Albert County, Culture and Heritage.

Today, it is the third largest producer of production of over 3 million kilograms.

Indigenous people harvested this liquid gold for centuries before the arrival of the Europeans. They shared their knowledge with the first settlers, providing the only source of sugar for many families.

The Mi'kmaq used birch bark containers placed at the bottom of a maple tree in which a "V" cut was made, and a reed placed at the bottom to direct the sap into the container. The sap was then boiled in a hollowed-out log filled with water into which red hot rocks were repeatedly placed until the water boiled and syrup was produced.



New Brunswick has a long history of syrup in Albert County was in the of commercial maple syrup production. early 1840's by the Colpitts family of Pleasant Vale. In their first year, they maple syrup in the world with an annual gathered enough sap to produce 6200lbs of product.

> At that time, horse drawn sleds were used to haul the large vat filled with the sap from cans hung on the tree spiel and gathered by the men and women on snowshoes. The vats were then taken to the sugar camp where it was drained into the evaporator and in some cases large cauldrons over open fires.

> Today, most all commercial producers are on pipelines connected from tree to tree that then drains into large collection vats placed lower on the hillside to allow gravity to do its work.

To increase productivity and efficiency, many new methods are The first commercial production employed: from pre-heating the sap to

> using the steam heat produced from the evaporator to an osmosis system that removes the majority of the water from the sap before it enters the evaporator.

Last year, maple syrup producers reported \$38.8-million in revenues or 4.9% of NB total farm operating revenues.

The experience of going to the sugar woods and attending a "sugaring-off" is a Spring ritual that no child or adult should go without. An NB "rite of passage!"


