Petitcodiac Fire Department Takes Delivery of Two New Fire Trucks

The Petitcodiac fire department is pleased to announce that we have taken delivery of two new fire trucks. A new rescue truck, which has been

planned for five years and ordered in 2022, as well as a new Spartan Pumper to replace the pumper that was destroyed in a motor vehicle collision in spring 2023. Both vehicles were supplied

by Fort Garry Fire Trucks.

Rescue 14 is the new rescue truck. It has a long list of improvements over our previous unit. This truck will carry firefighters and equipment that deal with many different emergencies

such as Motor Vehicle Collisions, entrapments, medical emergencies, etc.

Engine 12 is a new pumper and is the first custom cab pumper in the Petitcodiac Fire Department's history. This truck is a pumper tanker that will be first out for all emergencies. This truck was featured on the international stage at the world's largest annual fire service trade show, FDIC international, in Indianapolis.

These two vehicles will be in service for the next 25 years, servicing Petitcodiac, as well as mutual aid partners in Elgin, Havelock, Salisbury, and Penobsquis areas. Your firefighters take great pride in these two vehicles and will continue to respond to emergencies for years to come.

The Petitcodiac Fire Department responds to all hazards, motor vehicle collisions, wildland fires, off road rescues, structure fires, and medical emergencies. We also attend and host many public events, as well as visits to schools, daycares, nursing homes etc.

It takes over 5000 hours annually to run the fire department and we respond to approximately 150 calls a year. We have twenty Fire Fighters as well as four support members. Training nights are Tuesdays at 7:00pm. We NEED members. Volunteerism is on the decline for all organizations nationally, and firefighting is one of the organizations

planned for five years and ordered in 2022, as well as a new Spartan Pumper to replace the pumper that was destroyed in a motor vehicle collision in spring 2023. Both vehicles were supplied by Fort Garry Fire Trucks.

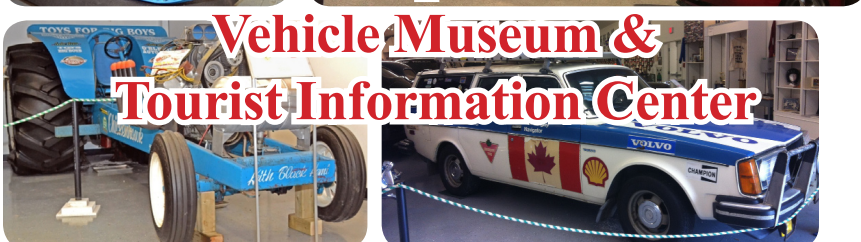

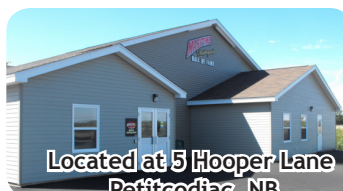

Walk Around The Block - Part 5

We left off with the movie theater being sold to a Nova Scotia company. The new owners soon fell to the same fate as the Pollock family, fewer numbers attending the movies due to more and more homes having their own television sets. For a period of time the theatre was only open for Friday and Saturday nights. The theatre equipment and seats were sold off to cover mounting debts.

Tenants then moved into the vacant building, Ross McCully opened a pool room and taxi service there which operated for four years. Bernice's Beauty Salon occupied a small area for a few years.

The building was sold for taxes and purchased by J.P. Waterbury and Sons. In the 1960's a small printing shop occupied one part and a local green house sold flowers for Easter and Mother's Day. The front of the building was used briefly as a warehouse for Stedman's store.

During the early 1980's, 1981-1982, the building was torn down, leaving behind memories of joyous afternoons with great friends, first movies, first dates, concerts and

meeting celebrities. Following the Old Post Road towards the river we passed the next building, now a private home. Several different businesses were located here over the years. One of the last to be there was the Ten Thousand Villages store owned and operated by the Mennonite Church. The church now operates the Pantry and the adjoining thrift store.

We walked past the location of the railway spur line to Havelock and a now vacant parking lot, the former location of a warehouse, harness shop and carriage house.

Our next stop was at the Wine 'O Warehouse, another building with an interesting history.

Built as a Lumber and Building Materials store by the J. E. Humphrey family, the building contained the business on the main floor and apartments above. A large warehouse was located at the rear. The Humphrey's operated a lumber mill in the village and a store on Main Street. They moved to the larger building after closing the store on Main Street, due to lack of

Mr James Humphrey and his wife the former May A. Wilmot lived and worked in the community for many years. James took over the family mill and business following his father Hiram's illness. James had been working on the railway. His son George took over the business from James.

James was well known for his extensive collection of historical artefacts, which can be researched through New Brunswick Archives, and known as the Humphrey Papers.

After being closed as a lumber and building supplies store, the store became the Petitcodiac Super Variety. A very busy spot in the community. The business was sold and moved to a new location on Smith Street, Needs store, where it is known to many still as the Super Variety.

The building now has several businesses, Wine'O Warehouse, a Beauty Salon and a Dance Studio. Other businesses have been located there over the years.

Up stairs the building still has apartments. Currently the building is undergoing renovations and new businesses are being added.

We continued our walk and passed the location next to the Humphrey's store that was the location of the Last Chance Restaurant circa 1910. The postcard shows not only the restaurant but the Humphry's store under construction.

We then came to the building, now a private home, that was the location of the second telephone office, it was moved there from Kay Street circa

1925. The telephone office was located on the main floor with the switchboard located upstairs, then moved to the main floor. Miss Elsie Lockhart was a telephone operator in the community for many years.

In 1936 there were 291 phone subscribers in the local area. Some in our group could recall their phone number from earlier years, when all calls went through the switchboard. My parents' number was 1- 2 - 9 ring 12. Waiting for others to finish their phone calls on a party line was sometimes frustrating to say the least.

This building, when the telephone office closed, became several different businesses over the following years before being renovated for a private home. One of the previous businesses included a radio and TV repair shop, operated by Lee Smith (then King's TV). The small building alongside it, which became a garage, was once the Maple Leaf Cafe, operated by E. Eastwick.

As our group arrived back at the starting point of the walk around the block, everyone was amazed at the vast amount of local history in this small one block area.

When we paused at our starting/ending point I shared an artefact from my family with the group. Lots of interesting guesses, I will enclose a picture with this article and hopefully during this year's walk, 2024, we can find out what it is.

Until then, thank you to all who helped out and to all who came for the Walk Around the Block.

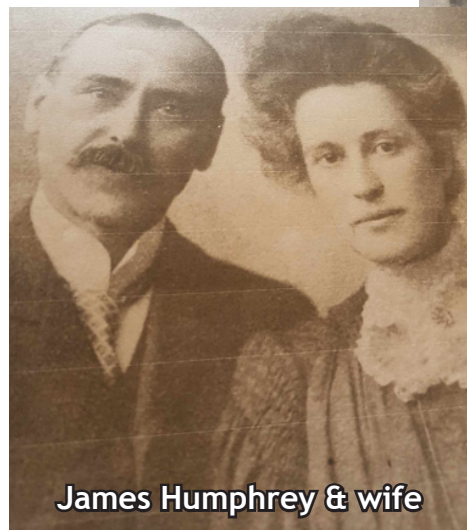

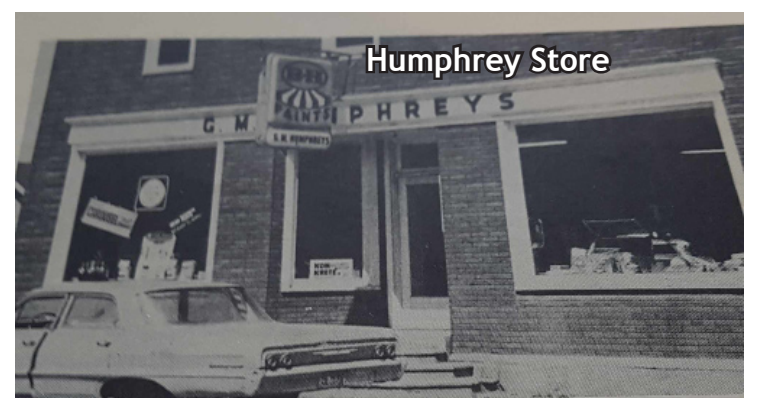

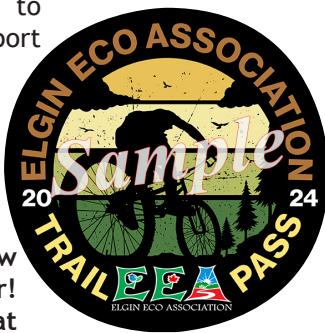

ELGIN WOMEN'S INSTITUTE And So, What Happened Next?...

We left off this series with the movement of Women's Institutes spreading across Canada. By June 12, 1911 the first Branch of WI was formed in New Brunswick and by June 26 of that same year, the women of Elgin established the Elgin Women's Institute (EWI).

But before we continue, we need to take a step back and take a quick glance at the history of the Elgin area.

In 1811, John Geldart emigrated from Yorkshire, England to become the first settler of Elgin (Corner). As time went on surrounding communities sprang up (Parkindale in 1822; Goshen in 1824; Prosser Brook in 1829; Pleasant Vale in 1831-32). By 1847 Elgin became a separate parish and was given its name in honor of James Bruce, the 8th Earl of Elgin. Remember, this was before Confederation (1867) when New Brunswick joined with three other provinces to become the Dominion of Canada.

As surrounding communities expanded with new settlers and their families, the population of Elgin grew. Around 1858 farmers formed an Agricultural Society whose "goal of the Society was to introduce improved breeds of stock, seed, and methods of agriculture".

By the late 1890's, the Agricultural Society decided that the idea of building a hall seemed like a natural progression for the industry and community as a whole. Plans went ahead and by 1900 The Hall was a reality. The large two storey building still stands today and is the home of the Elgin Women's Institute.

Women's Institutes in NB are affiliated with the provincial Department of Agriculture, Aquaculture and Fisheries. Much happened in the years between 1900 and 1970 (year EWI became owners). The Hall has always remained true to an agriculture theme in one form or another as well as aquaculture (salmon research in the late 1940's). Also, The Hall has recently been the base for a salmon release program to local rivers.)

So, in keeping with our agriculture heritage and roots, the Elgin Women's Institute is planning a very interesting, timely and updated event on Elgin Day in August. More details will be published in the August issue of this paper.

There you have it!....a brief history of Elgin interspersed with reference to the WI. Stay tuned for details of the day EWI became the third branch in this province to be organized. What a Day!

What's Cooking? In Winona's Kitchen

STRAWBERRY ICE-CREAM PIE
In a cooled, baked 9-inch pie shell spoon 2 pints of slightly softened strawberry ice-cream Set in freezer until very firm.

In a heavy saucepan combine 16 large marshmallows with 2 tablespoons crushed ripe strawberries. Set over low heat, folding until marshmallows are half melted. Remove from heat and continue folding until mixture is smooth and foamy. Next blend in 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract and 2 drops of red food coloring. Set aside to cool.

Beat 2 egg whites and 1/4 teaspoon of salt until frothy, gradually add 1/4 cup of white sugar beating constantly until stiff peaks form. Combine egg white mixture with cooled marshmallow mixture, Folding until evenly blended.

Remove ice-cream filled pastry from freezer. Cover with 1 cup of sliced strawberries. Spread with egg and marshmallow mixture, sealing the edges.

Place pie on a wooden board and set under broiler, with top of pie about 4 inches from the heat until top is lightly browned.

Serve Immediately. OR place in freezer until you are ready to serve.

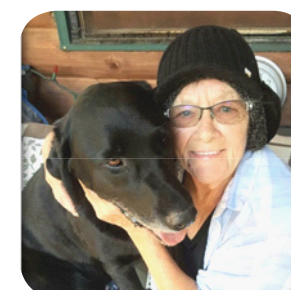
My prayer for tomorrow is a very small thing. But in the far more important prayers that you and I give to God, we are taught to persevere in the storms of trials.

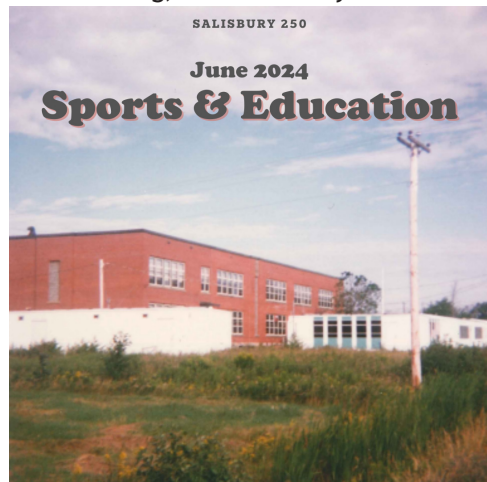


Salisbury Happenings



2024 marks 250 years since the Salisbury area was permanently settled. Over the course of this year, each month will be filled with themed events, celebrations, history, heritage and more!

In the exciting time of graduation season, we celebrated the successes of our students as they look toward their futures. Through these celebrations, we reflected on the past, learning about the educational history in Salisbury and how we've gotten to where we are today. Starting with smaller schoolhouses across Westmorland County and Albert County, the construction of the first school was an important milestone. After the schoolhouse on Fredericton Road burned down around 1904, a new school was built around 1905 by Salisbury resident Lou Wright. Salisbury Superior School was, and still is, affectionately referred to as "the Blue School." This building is still standing, and currently houses the

Boys and Girls Club of Salisbury. Then came construction of Salisbury Regional High School in 1947 (currently Salisbury Elementary School), and finally the opening of JMA Armstrong High School approximately 40 years ago (with it and the attached Salisbury Middle School having since been consolidated as Salisbury Regional School).

Also as part of the ongoing Salisbury 250 programming, installation was planned in June for 41 banners to line Salisbury's Main Street featuring unique and significant people, places, and things throughout our region's history. Residents are encouraged to view the banners, which will be on display until Veterans Banners are installed in November, while learning more about the photos on the banners using the write-ups available on the Town website. Printed booklets of these write-ups are also available in person, while supplies last, at the Town Office and Salisbury Public Library.

Since the permanent settlements in 1774 and the settlements that existed before that, the Salisbury we know today has a lot of history to cover! While the 41 banners feature highlights of different elements to celebrate our heritage following a public call for nominations last year, we know there is still more to celebrate. With that, we invite anyone who has additional stories, people, or places to submit information via our online form at www.salisburynb.ca/salisbury-250 to be integrated into future Salisbury 250 programming, from social media posts to website write-ups.

The Town of Salisbury appreciates the financial support of



both the Government of Canada and the Government of New Brunswick, who are partners in Salisbury 250 initiatives, including the banner program.

July's focus for Salisbury 250 will be on the Petitcodiac River.

Update on New Salisbury Fire Hall

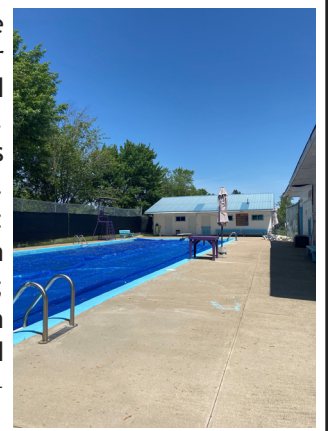
As you know, the Town of Salisbury is working on the construction of a new Salisbury Fire Rescue facility to adequately serve the needs of the Town's volunteer fire department and ensure they have space and resources to continue providing an exceptional level of service for residents. During a Special Council Meeting on May 27, 2024, the Town awarded the tender for the construction of the facility to Maxim Construction Inc. This followed the closing of the bids which received five submissions, with the successful proponent being the lowest bidder. Pursuant to the tender specifications, the Town continues to anticipate occupying the facility by Fall of 2025.

Like everyone, people with mental health issues have many needs in addition to their mental health. 211 Service Navigators do not look at mental health issues in isolation. If someone does not have adequate income, housing or other basic needs, it is very difficult to move ahead with mental health concerns. A 211 Service Navigator took a call from a woman in Fredericton who introduced herself as the sister of a person who suffers from mental illness. She explained that her sister would soon have no income left and was being evicted from her apartment. She also spoke about how her sister was also looking for employment. After listening to the caller and clarifying her situation, the Service Navigator was able to connect her with several resources. The Service Navigator first gave the caller referrals to NB Housing, the NB

Housing Navigators and the Canada Housing Benefit, and let her know how these programs worked and how they could help her sister. The Service Navigator then offered her the contact information for social assistance at the Department of Social Development and explained how this program functioned. Finally, the Service Navigator suggested calling the Canadian Mental Health Association for programs to help with mental health support, self-esteem and job skills building. The caller said that she was very thankful for the many resources. She took the time to write the contacts down and repeated them back to the 211 Service Navigator. After the call, the Service Navigator reflected that it is very important for them to probe and clarify the caller's situation that is explained in order to offer all of the relevant resources, because life's challenges don't often happen in isolation. Next time you're not quite sure where to turn to find the help that you need, remember that Help Starts Here, with 211.
