Amphitheatre to be Constructed in Highland Park, Salisbury, NB

The Town of Salisbury will see a number of improvements Highland to Park after combined investment from each level of government and community partners. The series of projects and

capital investments at the park are ramp access to the stage, and a heated intended to celebrate a community anniversary and promote opportunities for community gatherings, enhance designed by local artists, that will pay tourism potential, and provide amenities for arts and culture opportunities. In 2024, the Town of Salisbury is celebrating the 250th anniversary of permanent settlement in the region. This amphitheatre will include a commemorative plaque paying tribute to the community anniversary (in English, French, and Mi'kmaq), accessible seating areas and

storage building;

The installation of a public art mural, tribute to the region's natural and ecological history. It will feature seven species of plants and seven species of birds, paying tribute to the Indigenous principle of planning for seven generations in recognition of the ongoing partnership between the Town and Fort Folly Habitat Recovery at Highland Park and the additional partnership with Fort Folly First Nation on this project and community anniversary;

The installation of underground electrical bollards at the upper level of the park, which will increase the Town's ability to both enhance existing year-round events and introduce new offerings;



Petitcodiac Library Update

Dear Friends and Neighbors,

For me and many others, the summer means catching up on some reading! However, this is the first summer without our public library and people are likely feeling the void (I know that I am). While it may seem like nothing is happening, I want to assure you that progress is being made toward our new library home and many hands are working behind the scenes.

Last fall, when the library doors closed, it wasn't just the end of an erait was the beginning of a promising new chapter. Your municipal leaders, the

library board, and provincial library staff enriching community life. have been diligently working to ensure enhanced facilities and resources.

As is common knowledge by now, the municipality has successfully acquired the historic United Church on Church Street intending to retrofit it as a home for our library. As a library board, we are deeply grateful to the congregation and church leaders for recognizing our library's indispensable role in the community. Their generous decision to offer their building underscores the shared commitment to

that our library returns and does so with focused on assessing the structural renovations required to transform this charming space into a state-of-the-art public library that meets-and exceedsprovincial standards. This detailed needs analysis involves collaboration with both governmental and non-governmental libraries and make use of the online partners to ensure every aspect of the library's design is considered and catered to.

> The municipality is actively working with Englobe Engineering on the details. An initial consultation has been completed and a list of requirements was provided. This nearly 100-page document was reviewed to combine the needs of the building with the needs and requirements of a public library.

> At this time, the municipality has returned to Englobe to help price out the various upgrades, including floor supports, sprinkler systems, and accessibility upgrades. As you can likely deduce, these will not be cheap fixes! Your library board is currently looking at some promising funding opportunities to help the municipality cover the costs. Realistically, this work will cost hundreds of thousands of dollars and the municipality has assured us of their commitment to do whatever they can to see this project through to completion.

> These processes are meticulous and time-consuming, but they are crucial to making sure that our new library will serve our community effectively for decades to come. We ask for your continued trust and patience as we work towards this goal. We understand that supporters of the library may be looking for ways they can assist in this process so we have developed a list:

"Agriculture In The Community: Bring It Back To Our Roots"

"....the annual exhibition of the Agricultural Society took place with a fine day as special inducement for the farmers to be seen urging their way towards "the Corner: each with "a big ox" or "a big calf" before him, and with "a big potato" in his pocket, and lucky was he with a "big family" for at no other time could its members be so utilized as on "fair day" in the transportation of produce to and from the show."

"At noon between three and four hundred persons had assembled to note the progress made by each other




Blueberry Dumplings

Ken entered the sport of stock car racing as a driver. He raced at the horse race track in Dieppe, a track in Prince Edward Island and at River Glade Speedway.




In 1966, Ken became the official flagman at River Glade Speedway. He also flagged at tracks in Nova Scotia and other tracks in New Brunswick.

River Glade Speedway - Where It All Started

Setting the stage for stockcar racing and the birth of River Glade Speedway. Ernie McLean, a New Brunswicker from Chatham, became involved with the sport of Stockcar racing, while living and working in the Port Credit area of Ontario. In 1957, he began attending races at Pinecrest Speedway with his step father, Clarence MacEachern, there he met Jim Hallahan, a legendary racer, who sold him his 1 st stock car, a Jalopy, and Ernie got the bug. In 1959 Ernie started racing at tracks in the Ontario region including, racing at Pinecrest, Flamboro, Sutton, Nilestown and the CNE was the last race he raced in Ontario, with a Late Model stockcar he built himself.

In 1964, at age 27 the desire to return home, build a stockcar track, and bring the Ontario style of racing to New Brunswick. On the May long weekend, Ernie with his family moved to River Glade. He became employed with Drury's Transport, Petitcodiac as a

mechanic and bought a farm near River Sears, Lonzo Gauvin, Lewis Hansen, Glade, on the site of the present River Glade Speedway. Ernie went about drumming up interest with meetings, posters and talk. He also started to build a quarter mile track out "behind the barn".

The Sport of stockcar racing in the Maritimes was, for all intents and purposes, dead, on August 21, 1964.

Finally, on August 22, 1964, the first race at the new facility was run, with the help of friends, and it was an "immediate hit". The track was dirt, a guarter mile carved out of Westmorland County farm land, to imitate Pinecrest Speedway. Posts and cables served as fencing. There was no concrete retaining wall. Announcing and scoring was done from the back of the truck that Ernie moved back to New Brunswick with, parked near the finish line. There was no flag stand. Herman Berry Sr. flagged from the side of the track. 314 fans first race. Fans paid \$1.00 as they drove into the field to park. Spectator comfort was still in the planning stage.

There have been recent news harvest." (John 4:35) reports from our neighbours to the south that some states have legislated mandatory Bible teaching in the public school system and for the 10 commandments to be displayed at public schools.

I have mixed feelings. From a Christian perspective, it looks promising that possibly some leaders may be realizing that the current situation in our Western culture is due to the fact we have turned away from God for the past few decades. I personally believe the current culture of division, hatred and anger is the result of that turning away.

But I don't believe that we can impose Christianity on anyone. Yes, legalistic religion can be imposed on people, and it has been done throughout history and the results are rarely positive. True Christianity is a very personal thing. I cannot "give" it to anyone else. I can teach it, share it, explain it and discuss it, but the other person must accept it and adopt it as their own. It is a personal spiritual relationship with God brought on by what Jesus Christ has done for them.

Paul told the church in Ephesus that "For it is by grace you have been saved, through faith-and this is not from yourselves, it is the gift of God-not by works, so that no one can boast." (Ephesians 2:8 and 9) He was saying it cannot be legislated, earned, bought or sold, but is a free gift of God.

while it may So encouraging that the Bible may be brought back into our culture, at least in some states in the US, what we really need is the hearts of people coming back to God. Not forced or coerced but drawn in by the Love of God and His people, the Church.

Jesus told His followers: "Don't you have a saying, 'It's still four months until harvest'? I tell you, open your eyes and look at the fields! They are ripe for

- The installation of 3D signage that, for 2024, will provide an interpretive experience related to the community anniversary and for future years, continue to be a permanent asset commemorating this important project and to serve as a marketing tool for the Municipality.

To support this project, the Department of Canadian Heritage is contributing up to \$457,015 towards park improvements through the Legacy Fund component of the Building Communities through Arts and Heritage For the amphitheatre Program. component specifically, the Government of Canada will be contributing an additional \$107,000 through the Atlantic Canada Opportunities Agency (ACOA)'s Tourism Growth Program and will be planned upon completion.

the Government of New Brunswick will ...land that will nearly double the be contributing \$107,000 through the Regional Development Corporation (RDC)'s Community Development Fund.

For land acquisition, the Town has also partnered with the Fundy Biosphere Region for a contribution of \$39,300, given the Park's ability to immerse residents in nature. The Town will be leveraging the investment of over \$700,000 and will be making a contribution of approximately \$275,000 through the Town's Operating Budget and using the Canada Community Building Fund (CCBF) amphitheatre, land acquisition, signage, and mural installation. 

Every summer, the absence of easily acquired provisions costs the lives of some vacationers. So take the time to prepare a kit outfitted with common medications and supplies.

Encounters with animals are one concern. Run-ins with big ones, like moose or bears, are rare but dangerous. A simple noise maker might be all you need to avoid surprising mama bear and her cubs. But for most vacationers, it's smaller creatures that cause big trouble, like the stings of wasps, bees, yellow jackets and hornets.







Celebrating Salisbury 250!

The Petitcodiac River is one of the most SALISBURY 250 significant elements in Salisbury's history. Originally named Epetkutogoyek (meaning "the river that bends like a bow"), the river has served as a landmark, a method of transportation, a necessity for early survival, and a home to many; and we know this cannot be taken for granted. As discussed in February during our conversations on transportation, we learned that the river was fundamental in the decision to settle here. Before the Yorkshire settlers arrived in 1774, the Acadians inhabited this area along the river, following the lead of the



first indigenous settlers of the area. Many sought shelters along the bank to benefit from the rich soil, food and nutrient supplies, transportation, and navigation. Throughout history, the Petitcodiac River has been home to many species of fish, plants, and mammals. Pictured above is a group of pilot whales



that washed ashore along the bank of the river in Salisbury (taken in 1932). In modern days, many continue to advocate for the well-being of the river and its ecosystem. As we have learned in part with the Salisbury 250 Banner Program, Chief Joe Knockwood is a prominent name associated with this advocacy, with his vision for removing the Petitcodiac River causeway, which led to Fort Folly's efforts to restore the endangered Atlantic Salmon to the Petitcodiac River. As we celebrated the Petitcodiac River in July, we celebrated its legacy in the Salisbury area, acknowledging its prominence in our

Rezoning Request - Public Hearing scheduled for August 7

The Town of Salisbury has received an application to re-designate a portion of Residential (RU) Zoning to Village Centre (VC) to permit multi-unit dwellings, specifically up to three (3) sixunits and two (2) eight units, on Dundee Drive (PID 00816140). This application involves a proposed re-zoning, a Municipal Plan Amendment, and a text amendment to change the minimum lot area requirements for multiple unit dwellings to match Provincial regulations. Following an introduction of a re-zoning application on June 24, 2024, Salisbury Town Council set the Presentation for a Municipal Plan Amendment for the Regular Council Meeting on July 8, 2024. In light of the application, there will be a public hearing for any person wishing to speak for or against the proposed amendment and application. The Public Hearing will be held at 7:00pm on Wednesday, August 7, 2024 at the Municipal Office (56 Douglas Street, Salisbury). Written comments in favour of or opposed to the application can also be forwarded, in writing, to the Town Clerk at clerk@salisburynb.ca. New By-Laws Enacted

At their July 8 meeting, Salisbury Town Council gave third and final reading to four new by-laws. The majority of the content of the new by-laws reflects existing Provincial legislation that is already in effect in New Brunswick, including in former Local Service Districts (LSDs). Proceeding with these, as well as further by-law review, is a process to update former Village By-laws and reflect the new municipal boundaries, without placing unnecessary regulations and/or restrictions on former LSDs. 

and have an anaphylactic reaction, you would want an emergency bee sting kit within quick access. A loaded syringe containing epinephrine needs to be injected under the skin. At the same time the victim should swallow a couple of antihistamine tablets.

You don't require a medical degree to diagnose a bee sting or give an injection. The important thing is to have this kit available, and for everyone to know where it is located. Even the world's most brilliant doctor would have to stand helplessly by and watch the patient die if without this medication. Before you leave, ask your doctor to provide you with some broad spectrum antibiotic capsules.

These are not to be used for the common cold. But if someone suddenly develops a boil or a raging fever, chest pain, and begins to cough up copious amounts of sputum, there is a 99 percent chance that these capsules are what the doctor would order.

Holiday time is notoriously hard on the stomach. Many people eat and drink too much causing a transient



for a few days is the first step towards a resolution. But you can also help nature by swallowing a few antacid tablets for a day or two. If the upset is accompanied by vomiting, checking with a doctor on treatment options is the best move.

Summer is also a time for injuries, and a support bandage in the medical supply bag will come in handy when someone sprains an ankle. A few tablets of codeine will aid in relieving the pain.

Infection often plagues those who take to the woods in summer. Children, in particular, are prone to ear and eye infections from swimming. Most of these common ailments quickly respond to antibiotic drops or ointment. If they appear to be getting worse, head for the nearest clinic.

Remember to throw in some sunscreen, band aids, antiseptic, aspirins, and calamine lotion for poison ivy, bug bites, and rashes. And always, always, check for ticks when coming in from the outdoors.
