Elgin Women's Institute So, what Happened?!?!

are arriving from Europe to make a new start in what would become New Brunswick. Settlers made their way inland by various waterways and /or by foot to begin a new life in a new and unexplored land. Life was going to be challenging!

The first settler to Elgin was John Gildart in 1806. As time passed more brave and hopeful families arrived. The challenges and hardships were many but the area grew. By the late 1800's the many farmers formed an Agricultural Society with the purpose of the promotion and expansion of agriculture.

Before long they built a large two storey building known as the Agricultural Hall to help area farmers with new methods of agriculture. The women got involved also and held fundraising suppers for various needs and projects. That two storey building still stands today....The Elgin Women's Institute Hall!

In 1911, the EWI was formed.

It's the early 1800's and settlers Suppers had been held in other venues in the community but now there was a large building which has served the area well. In the very early days the second storev was the location of fundraisers including suppers. Food was donated and suppers sold for \$2. Fast forward to 2024....the tradition continues!







Hospice Sussex - Who Are We And What Do We Do?

- We are a non profit, volunteer-based community service offered here in Sussex and surrounding area since 2006.
- With no government funding, we rely totally on the generosity of our community supporters. These funds are used to cover costs associated with training, continuing education and office support.
- We offer non-medical support to clients and their families facing a lifelimiting healthcare journey. Up until recently our services were only offered to people facing end of life and those left grieving loved ones. Now our support begins earlier to support those with a life-limiting healthcare diagnosis, such as chronic/progressive/debilitating illnesses and dementia.
- Our services include helping to arrange medical equipment loans; help arrange drives to medical appointments, for groceries, and enjoyment; short-term relief for caregivers when their loved one cannot be left alone; companionship and family support. Our volunteers are available to visit at home, in hospital and nursing homes.
- We also offer grief support, through counselling as well as a follow-up program of phone calls and letters for 13 months.
- We have a lending library in our office with books and videos on a variety of chronic and life limiting illnesses, end of life care and grief. These are available for loan by contacting the Hospice Sussex office.
- These services are all free of charge and no referral is necessary.
- We recently developed and adopted a new 3 year strategic plan whereby we identified areas of strengths and weaknesses.
- Although our strengths are many, the most important is our mission to support people at a crucial time in their lives. We've identified the importance of being involved earlier in a diagnosis to establish a relationship thus making it easier later.
- The biggest weakness identified was awareness. The community's awareness of who we are and what we offer or that we even exist is surprisingly low. "Hospice" is automatically associated with dying, death and a palliative care home, rather than kindness, compassion and living the best life possible...right to the end.
- Our hope is to create awareness by establishing relationships and collaborate with other organizations and service groups to utilize all services inorder to meet the growing needs of our community.







"Are you Closed or Open"

A few weeks ago we were on a Douthwright, David Hoar (Amy) and car cruise with a group and we stopped at the largest wooden church in North America. It was the Sainte-Marie church at Church Point in Nova Scotia.

> The caregiver came and gave the group a tour and some information about the incredible building and the story behind it. It is a beautiful building. He went on to share that when he was young, the building would be filled twice each Sunday, and it seats 900 people. He also shared that when the decision came to close the building as a church. the attendance was less than what was there with the club, which would be 70 or 80 people. He went on to say that three churches have recently closed in that area.

> That didn't surprise me. It is a common theme in many communities. What surprised me was the response from the group. There was sadness from most of the people. I was expecting maybe indifference, but not sadness.

> What makes us sad to see churches close? Do we long for the days when society was safe and neighbors were good to each other and you left your doors unlocked? There could be lots of reasons for our sadness, but it doesn't have to be true for us, as individuals. What I am about to say may rub some people the wrong way but be patient and hear me out.

> If those churches that are closing are just cold institutions that exist so that they can continue their own legacy of rules, legalism and coldness, then let them close.

> God is not looking for open buildings. He is looking for open hearts. The biblical church was never a building, it was a group of people with open hearts searching for God and finding Him in a loving relationship. It is easy to think that God is so big and distant that he does not care about individuals. That is not true. God is so infinitely big that He cares for each individual deeply, from the one who is writing this to the one who is reading it and the one who turns the page to read something else.

> Jesus says in Matthew 10:29-31 "Are not two sparrows sold for a penny? Yet not one of them will fall to the ground outside your Father's care. And even the very hairs of your head are all numbered. So don't be afraid; you are worth more than many sparrows.

> So if it has become cold and empty, let the building close, but keep your heart open. God sees you and knows you, and He cares for you, not the building. Open up to Him.

A Number of Ways to Report Criminal Activity

If you see crime happening in your area, or wish to report that criminal activity has taken place, there are a few different approaches to take:

- (1) If an incident is still in progress or is an emergency, please call 911.
- (2) There is also the daytime non-emergency phone number for Southeast District RCMP Caledonia Regional Detachment, which is located at the corner of Pine Glen and Whitepine in Riverview: 506-387-2222.
- (3) There is also the Online Crime Reporting (OCR) website (https://ocresielc.rcmp-grc.gc.ca/en) that was introduced in recent years. Types of crime that can be reported using this online tool are mischief/damage to property under \$5,000, theft under \$5,000 (including theft of a bicycle and theft from a vehicle under \$5,000), and lost property. This tool can take the place of having to phone the province-wide RCMP non-emergency line (1-888-506-RCMP) or visiting a detachment such as Caledonia. At the end of filing a report using OCR, you will receive an e-mail confirmation with an incident number and a report, which can be used for insurance purposes.
- (4) Another option is the New Brunswick Department of Justice and Public Safety's Safer Communities and Neighbourhoods (SCAN) Investigative Unit. SCAN works closely with policing services such as the RCMP to remove the criminal element from communities. The difference is: with the SCAN Act not being criminal legislation, this is a civil law approach through Court of King's Bench in which property owners and occupants are held responsible for criminal activity such as prostitution, drugs, illegal liquor, illegal gaming, illegal firearms and organized crime, including fortified houses. Another difference under the SCAN Act as opposed to a criminal investigation is that the complaint remains confidential and it is the SCAN officer, not the complainant, who appears in court. SCAN is a community-driven program in that it takes complaints directly from public complainants who are affected in cases where safety is an issue. The goal of SCAN is to make an area feel safe again through both non-judicial and judicial actions. Salisbury 250 - August Theme: Early Settlers

The Salisbury 250 programming these two groups befriended each other it to be today. has been celebrating the anniversary of permanent settlement in the Salisbury area. When the Yorkshires travelled overseas to start a new life in North America, they settled in this area 250 years ago. Many Salisbury residents today are descendants from this group of Yorkshires. However, we know that Salisbury's history did not start there. Indigenous encampments could be found along the Petitcodiac River for centuries before the Yorkshires' arrival. The river provided a method of transportation, a place to gather food, and was often used as a landmark when drawing maps. When the Acadians arrived in the area,

and benefited from what each could offer; the Indigenous peoples taught the Acadians how to survive the cold winters, and the Acadians offered new goods and materials to trade. These early settlers became friends - some would even consider each other family. Beausoleil Village (in present-day Allison) is an important landmark in Acadian history during the time of the Acadian Expulsion. Joseph Broussard led his fellow Acadians to safety by leading them to the Salisbury area, until eventually leading them South. To read more about Joseph Broussard and Beausoleil Village, explore the


