We also have a cardboard recycling container next to the glass recycling bins; and a place to put your branches and wood ashes, just past the Public Works Facility on the left.

What WILL BE collected?

Go to your **outside meeting place**. **Call 9-1-1** from a mobile phone or a trusted neighbor's phone.

Stay outside until the fire department tells you it is safe to go back inside.

Smolæ Alarms: Wake Them Work For You!



You could have as little as two minutes to get out safely once the smoke alarm sounds. Working smoke alarms give you early warning so you can get outside quickly.

Installation

- Install smoke alarms in every bedroom, outside each separate sleeping area (like a hallway), and on each level (including the basement) of the home.
- When installing, follow the instructions that come with the smoke alarm
- For the best protection, interconnect all smoke alarms. When one sounds, they all sound. It is important to have interconnected smoke alarms if you sleep with the bedroom doors closed.
- A smoke alarm should be on the ceiling or high on a wall.

How to Choose an Alarm

It is important to purchase a smoke alarm that is listed by a qualified testing laboratory. The two most common types of smoke alarms are ionization and photoelectric alarms.

- For the best protection, or where extra time is needed to wake up or help others, both types of alarms or dual sensor ionization-photoelectric alarms are recommended.
- An ionization smoke alarm is more responsive to flaming fires and a photoelectric smoke alarm is more responsive to smoldering fires.
- Photoelectric smoke alarms are the best type of alarms to be installed near the kitchen and bathrooms to reduce nuisance alarms.

Testing and Maintenance

- Test smoke alarms at least once a month by pushing the test button.
- Follow the manufacturer's instructions for cleaning to keep smoke alarms working.

Replacement

- Smoke alarms with nonreplaceable (long-life) batteries are designed to remain effective for up to 10 years. If the alarm chirps, warning that the battery is low, replace the entire smoke alarm right away.
- For smoke alarms that do not have non-replaceable (long-life) batteries, replace batteries at least once a year. If the alarm chirps, replace only the battery.

Statement regarding rezoning of PID 00816140

Meeting on September 9, 2024, Salisbury Town Council unanimously passed third reading of amendments to municipal by-laws to redesignate a parcel of land, being parcel bearing PID 00816140 (off of Dundee Drive), from Residential to Village Centre. The intent of this rezoning was to permit up to 34 units (rental apartments) in five (5) multiunit buildings, subject to conditions. Throughout the process, the proposed amendments passed unanimously by Council and previously at the Southeast Planning Review and Adjustment Committee (PRAC) at each phase of the process. Amendments of this nature entail a rigorous public process, which was undertaken and garnered both public support and opposition. On the evening of September 9, Council also discussed a petition received by over 80 neighbours re-zoning. Council appreciates the input office/council-meetings/.

During the Regular Council from all residents who weighed into the process which is indicative of the engagement of our residents and of the importance of the democratic process that provides opportunity for this public input. In light of some concerns raised in the petition, the Town felt it important to issue additional information regarding the decision. With third reading having been passed unanimously, a detailed statement was issued by Mayor Robert Campbell on behalf of Town Council. 

Today, Town Council is made up of the Mayor (Rob Campbell), Deputy Mayor (Jason Gallant), Councillors of Ward 1 (John-Wiebe Dykstra), Ward 2 (Phyllis Bannister), Ward 3 (Sarah Colwell, Stephanie Thorne, Nathan O'Blenis) and Ward 4 (Joe D'Ettore), in addition to the Clerk and Chief Administrative Officer. In addition to Council, Town staff work hard at providing and maintaining a positive atmosphere for residents in the community from day-to-day. Municipal staff currently consists of 10 full-time staff members, 1 full-time contract, and 1 seasonal worker. Staff is divided into four departments: Administration, Department of Infrastructure and Public Works, Department of Recreation and Wellness, and Protective Services.



Family members may want constraints. Rest assured that 211 Service Navigators are there to give information on options for financial assistance for people in desperate circumstances.

A 211 Service Navigator took a call from a mother who stated that her daughter, who was in her late teens, was pregnant. She continued to explain that her daughter did not have any income of her own and would need financial support and vitamin supplements throughout her pregnancy. She also mentioned that, unfortunately, she could not help her daughter herself in terms of finances.



Service Navigator to help their loved ones in financial listened to the caller and assured distress, but may not be able to do her that there was help available for so because of their own financial her daughter. She probed for more details and clarified the situation with the caller to make sure that she thoroughly understood what the daughter would need. She made referrals for both income assistance and help to acquire the needed vitamin supplements.

The caller wrote down the information and repeated it to the Service Navigator. The Service Navigator also encouraged the caller to have her daughter contact 211 herself for more assistance during the prenatal period and after the baby was born. The caller said she would let her daughter know about the referrals and also about the 211 service.
