


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Community of Three Rivers Snowshoe Lending Program





We enjoyed the Salisbury Santa Revenue Canada advising that I still owed over \$2,000 on my outstanding balance and when was I going to pay it. I was surprised because I had actually paid it off early. So I asked how there could be any balance when I made my last two payments on October 28 and November 1. After a bit of research by her, she advised me that those payments had been made. When I asked why then were they not showing on my account she advised that they were deposited into my 2024 tax account. I asked why would that be done when I owed money and had a payment agreement. I was advised just in case I owed taxes for this year. After I commented how ridiculous and illogical that was considering our 2024 tax returns aren't due until April 2025. I was then asked if I would like it to be transferred to pay off my outstanding bill. With my frustration point quite high I said I certainly wasn't donating it to the Revenue Canada Christmas party.

History Walk 2024 by Cathy Drury

OCTOBER 5TH 2024 AT 1:00PM - A group of enthusiastic individuals gathered in the parking lot by the Great Canadian Dollar Store to learn some of the History of the Community of Three Rivers. We were all prepared for a bit of time travel, sharing information and memories.

A special Thank You goes out to the assistants this year, Tammy Dickie and Susan Drury Saunders for being the photographer, and helpers with the photos, paintings and other memorabilia used during the walk. To all of those who took part in and added information, Thank You!

Thank you also to Joyce Barbour, who at the end of the walk presented the group with some information on Burlington Park.

Our first stop was on the steps to Stu's Barber Shop. We all had some great stories to relate about Stu, families going in for that "first" hair cut, and still visiting the shop for hair cuts today. The Barber shop has been in its present location since the rebuilding of the "Stedman's" store in 1994-1995, following the October 31st 1993 fire area of the parking lot, near the front that destroyed the former Stedman's building.

Stu took his training at Tech School In Moncton in 1964 and began working with Roy Anderson in his shop June 4th, 1965. Roy sold his business to Stu and a few years later in 1975 Gary Graham began working there, and is still there.

An interesting side story relating to the history of one of the barber chairs as told to us is as follows. Roy Anderson purchased the chair, at that time Lloyd Crandall was working in the shop with Roy. Lloyd left the shop to open his own business, leaving three chairs in the of the Great Canadian Dollar Store



shop. When Roy retired, Stu decided to sell the extra chair. It was purchased by Brenda Plume to use in her Barber Shop. The chair was recently donated to the Gagetown Military Museum where it will be used as a part of a display showing military haircuts over the years.

There is quite a list of celebrities who sat in the chair over the years, including, but not limited to Prime Minister Jean Chrétien, MLA Hollis Steeves, Premier Frank McKenna, Premier Richard Hatfield, Boxer Yvon Durelle, and MLA Bill Harmer, a regular customer.

The group then moved to the entrance of the Dollar Store. The location of the original Tom Smith, Petitcodiac 5¢ to \$1 Store. This business was originally built as a pool room and soda bar by Tom Smith and Leonard Crandall in 1946.

The building was sold to Stan Bransfield and opened in 1970 as a Stedman's store. Believe me when I say that there were a lot of memories of this store and those of us who worked there had a few stories to relate, to the amusement of many of those attending the walk.

By the time you read this, I suspect the New Year will have been upon us and about to be in the rear-view mirror. So, as believers, how do we want to start this year off?

Here is a passage from Peter, in 1Peter 2:1-3 Therefore, rid yourselves of all malice and all deceit, hypocrisy, envy, and slander of every kind. Like newborn babies, crave pure spiritual milk, so that by it you may grow up in your salvation, now that you have tasted that the Lord is good.

So to start off, have you had that first taste of the Lord? Or have you only tasted the stale emptiness of dead religion, where you must perform and follow the rules for God to let you into heaven? If you have only experienced the latter, then I encourage you to seek the Lord Himself, so that you can discover the Love, flavour and warmth of who He is.

If you have had the joy of tasting that the Lord is good, then this scripture is for you. He wants you to continue tasting Him. It is something that he wants us to do for as long as we live. The Christian life does not have a plateau. We do not get to a certain point where we reach some special level and don't need to progress any farther. A newborn baby doesn't eat one or two meals and then stop. It continues to eat because that is what makes it healthy and makes it grow. The Christian life is the same.

In the passage above, Peter is telling us to continue to crave that "Spiritual milk", because it will cause us to grow in our salvation. He is not saying we will become "More saved". Jesus already has done that for even the "Baby Christian". Peter is telling us that our Salvation is more than just a fact, but it is a living, growing thing that encompasses our entire being. It cleanses us and brings us joy and leads us into a deeper relationship with our Lord. But it only happens if we "Continue to Crave" this spiritual milk than comes from Him. That is done through prayer, scripture and spending time with His family, so that we can all grow together.

I pray that this year, you will taste and see that the Lord is good, and that you will "Continue to Crave" Him until you meet him face to face. Dave McPherson


Friday suppers are finished for the winter season, thank you for your support in 2024 they will be back in March 2025.
