

Happy 105th Birthday to Eleanor Smith-McFee!

Eleanor Smith-McFee, born on February 1, 1920 in Pleasant Vale N.B., is marking an incredible milestone—her 105th Birthday. She was honoured with a certificate presented by Sherry Wilson, MLA (pictured). Eleanor previously received a congratulatory letter from Queen Elizabeth II on her 100th Birthday and is now eagerly awaiting her recognition from King Charles III.

Teaching was Eleanor's lifelong passion. After completing Normal School in Fredericton in 1938, she embarked on her career teaching in various one-room schools in Lewis Mountain, Manhurst and Intervale. Later she taught in Elgin and at the "school on the hill" in Petitcodiac until her retirement.



Throughout her life, Eleanor has enjoyed cooking, sewing, gardening, traveling, and of course, her family whom she loves dearly. She lived humbly in Petitcodiac, serving her community, church and sharing her deep faith in God. Even after turning 100, Eleanor has shown remarkable resilience. She survived Covid-19 twice, endured painful shingles, and adapted to her life after a fall last year which crushed her ankle. Up until that time, she remained an avid reader and stayed connected with friends and family on Facebook daily.

Eleanor's life has been filed with extraordinary memories. She has

written a collection of her own experiences, living through the 1920s, the years, farming and the people she had met along her early years. Eleanor's story captures a century of change, progress, and innovation over a remarkable 105 years surrounded by her family, faith, and community.

Important Changes to Waste Collection in The Community of Three Rivers Effective the week of February 3, 2025

Starting the week of February 3, 2025, Eco360 is implementing changes to its waste collection system.

Waste collection across all of The Community of Three Rivers will take place on Wednesdays starting February 5th, 2025.

The system remains the same: Blue Bags - Collected every second week.

Clear Bags - Every second week opposite of Blue Bag collection.

Green Bags (Organics): Collected every week.

If you live anywhere in The Community of Three Rivers,

your garbage pick-up for February will be:

Wednesday February 5th Clear/ Green

Wednesday February 12th Blue/Green

Wednesday February 19th Clear/Green Wednesday February 26th Blue/Green

If you would like a paper copy of the schedule you can pick one up at the Municipal Office located at 63 Main Street, Petitcodiac. The schedule will also be available at Eco360.ca and on their mobile app as well as at www.threeriversnb.ca

NEW Bulky Waste Collection: One large item (appliance, furniture, etc.) can be collected every other week on Clear Bag Collection Day starting on February 5th, 2025. This schedule replaces previous seasonal (Spring/Fall) bulky waste collection. Please note that bulky waste collection may take up to 24 hours depending on the size or type of the item.

Elgin Women's Institute What is WI?

Readers may recognize the title of this month's article as one we have used before. As one of the relatively newer members of the Elgin Women's Institute I thought I would take over the column for the month and give my perspective of "What is WI."

As a newer resident of Elgin I moved here in the winter. I don't have children, and was off work for the season, so I went shopping for activities and happened across the WI. Before I joined I had some impressions of what the organization was all about.

My first concept of the Women's Institute was that it was like Girl Guides for adults. A WI meeting has a structure very similar to the Guide meetings I went to as a kid. There are little rituals that a meeting flows by, we start the meeting not exactly by "promising to do our best" but we start the meeting by saying Mary Stuart's Collect together as a group. Mary Stuart's Collect does just that it collects the group together, calling members to "meet each other face-to-face, without self-pity and without prejudice," this ritual creates an intention for the meeting which then goes on to share many other aspects with the Girl Guides of my childhood, we play games, sometimes cook for each other, and do service projects.

We haven't gone to camp, but I bet if I planned one we'd have a blast!

Another thing I thought WI was like was a guilting bee, a social event where you sit around and craft and gossip. There are aspects of a quilting bee, not so much gossip, but rather in the way C.S. Lewis describes friendship: as something where people who might not have much in common find love for each other by working towards common projects and goals. Like a making a quilt, or cooking a turkey supper, or maintaining the WI Hall.

As I got more involved I heard the history of the WI and it's accomplishments and came to think it as a sort of trade union for housewives. Historically the WI got together and fought for things like food safety standards. Not just housewives anymore WI is still does this. Today, lead by our sisters in Havelock, WI members are raising awareness of the dangers of radon and demanding something be done.

So what is WI? Girl Guides for adults, a quilting bee, a trade union? WI is all the best qualities of these groups. It has the structure, focus on service, and youthful spirit of Girl Guides. We find true friendship and connect philosophically by working towards common practical projects like at a quilting bee. We find the strength together to stand-up and make things better for all like trade union. That's what WI is to me.

WINTER OVERNIGHT STREET PARKING BAN

During the winter months from November 1st through to April 1st, The Community of Three Rivers, Ward 2 (Petitcodiac) has a By-Law in place that does not allow parking on any of our streets between the hours of midnight to 7am due to snow clearing operations. This allows our works department crew to complete the task of snow removal in a safe and timely manner.

BY-LAW NO. 40

Parking of Vehicles

- (a) In the months of November, December, January, February and March between the hours of 2400 and 0700 of any day no person shall park or leave a vehicle unattended on any street within the Village due to snow clearing operations.
 - **Vehicles left on Village streets will be towed away at owner's expense**

(b) No person shall take possession of vehicle removed or impounded under this bylaw, until all costs and charges for removal, care and storage of such vehicle have been paid.

We request that you respect this By-Law and park overnight in the parking lot on River Road. Parking of large vehicles is not permitted overnight on any streets or in any parking lots maintained by the village. Daytime street parking for large vehicles is only allowed for short periods of time for business purposes only. Thank you for your co-operation.



History Walk 2024 - Part 2

by Cathy Drury

As the group paused in front of the current Great Canadian Dollar Store, some wondered what had been in this area previously.

It was noted that several fires had devastated the village over the years, including a fire that destroyed most of the stores and businesses on Main Street, Kay Street and River Road. The fire was so intense that burning embers spread the fire across the railroad tracks and several homes, outbuildings and an undertakers room were destroyed.

This fire on September 22nd 1913, destroyed a newly built outdoor rink, and the following stores: W.H.Pollock, Mr G.A. Parkin and Son, W.H.Bickerton and T.J. Drysdale, the homes of Uz King, and Mr. Reynolds Lockhart and many other small buildings. The fire was so great that a fire engine was dispatched from Moncton on a special train, and arrived in time to prevent the entire business section from burning.

We noted at this location some of the buildings that were destroyed were quickly rebuilt, only to be destroyed in later fires.

One building that was not destroyed in the 1913 fire was the large Mansard House Hotel, on the corner of Main and Kay streets.

Built in 1871 by E.B.Chandler and financed and operated by Simeon Jones the Hotel became an important piece of local history. Politicians and some



well known celebrities stayed here. The Hotel had several managers over the years including E.S. Ritchie, Norman Doherty, Edmund Simpson, Clifford Price, and Delancy Killam. The Hotel did burn in 1919 and was replaced by the Bank of Nova Scotia. Scotia Bank stayed in this location until the new building was constructed in 1977.

The building was used for many purposes after the bank moved: a call center, farmer's market, flower shop, clothing store, and library are to name a few. Today it is the home of the Vault.

The picture of the bank is from circa 1967. There are a few familiar faces there.


The building plans for the bank are on display in the Community Museum.

Standing on the corner of Main and Kay Streets we take a brief stop here to admire several pictures and paintings before we move along Kay Street.

The painting of the Hotel was done

by Herb Holt and is on display at the Three Rivers Community Museum.

The history walk continued along Kay Street at this point and with many adding some of their memories as we go, our next stop involves some hats...

The needs of survivors of partner abuse do not disappear when the survivor leaves the relationship. They can still be in emotional and/or physical danger and need both practical and emotional support.

A female caller contacted 211 in distress because she was being harassed by someone she had briefly dated. The male in question kept sending obscene texts to her and was refusing to go and pick up his belongings. The caller was overwhelmed and did not know what to do. She was afraid of what he might do.

The Service Navigator informed the caller that she could contact the RCMP about the situation since she had fears for her safety. The caller's assessment of the threat that he posed to her was high because he already had a criminal record.

With the caller's permission, the Service Navigator at 211 also warm transferred the caller to a domestic violence outreach program, so they could give her emotional support and assist her at that moment with issues such as safety planning. The Service Navigator offered to explain the situation to the agent before warm transferring the caller, and the caller agreed - this way the worker at the outreach program was up to speed and could help the caller as soon as possible, without the caller having to re-share their difficult story.

As you can see, 211 navigators are there for you 24/7 to offer free and confidential supports by connecting you to the right programs or services for your specific situation. 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

Changes to Waste Collection Schedule for all Town of Salisbury Residents Effective Week of February 3, 2025

Town of Salisbury residents are advised of changes to the waste collection schedule, effective the week of February 3, 2025, for all residents in the Town of Salisbury, including the former Local Service Districts. As of that week, all waste for residents in the Town will be collected on Thursday. Thursday, February 6, 2025, will be the first collection day under the new schedule, which will also restart the colour rotation schedule. On that first day of collection, Garbage (Clear) and Organics (Green) will be collected.

With the change in schedule, as of the week of February 3, 2025, one large item (appliance, furniture, etc.) can be collected every other week alongside Garbage (Clear bags). This schedule replaces previous seasonal (Spring, Summer, Fall) bulk waste collections and is in addition to the ongoing Mobile Eco Depots throughout the year. Please note that the collection of bulk waste items may take up to 24 hours depending on the size or type of the item.

These changes are being made in light of the Town of Salisbury transitioning to the Regional Waste Collection contract involving most municipalities in the Southeast Region. This contract will be administered by Eco360, a division of the Southeast Regional Service Commission (who currently also operates the regional landfill).

To communicate these changes to residents, a mail-out is being sent to all residents in the Town the week of January 13, 2025. Printed copies of the new collection calendar will be available at the Salisbury Town Office in the coming weeks, or by contacting Eco360. Residents are encouraged to download the Eco360 app, where they will receive a push notification on Sunday, February 2, as well as on Wednesday, February 5, to remind them of the changes. Municipal Partners, including the Town of Salisbury, and Eco360 will also be communicating the changes on social media as we approach the changes. The Town will also be available to assist residents during the transition period, and appreciates the understanding of residents as the changes take effect.

Town of Salisbury Approves 2025 Operating and Utility Budgets During its public meeting on December 9, 2024, Salisbury Town Council approved the 2025 Budgets.

The General Operating Budget for the Town this year is \$7,881,268, with the property tax rates remaining unchanged for all five sub-units within the Town boundaries.

The Utility (Wastewater) Budget is \$496,479, with the rate for users on the Ward 3 (village) sewer system set at \$400/unit, also unchanged from 2024.

The budgets, which have been approved by the Government of New Brunswick, can be found online at https://salisburynb.ca/municipal-office/budget-financial-information/

"In 2024, we saw significant progress in our Town: many capital projects, including the start of our new fire hall and the reconstruction of the southern berm of our wastewater polishing pond, progress on residential development projects, and changes to the Town's operations to reflect Local Governance Reform," said Mayor Robert Campbell. "As committed to residents in 2024, the increase to the Town's property tax rate last year was an abnormal occurrence that was required to right-size the municipal budget. With thanks to Council's diligence on acting on strategic priorities in a fiscally-prudent fashion, and the increasing residential and non-residential tax base growth that reflects the competitiveness of our market and region, we are able to maintain the rate going into 2025 for all sub-units, while continuing to act on strategic priorities and maintain a competitive tax rate."

In 2024, former Local Service Districts (LSDs) paid 90% of their share of proportionate (shared service) costs. In 2025, this has been reduced to approximately 78%, reflecting Council's commitment to ensuring that all sub-units pay a fair and reasonable share for access and use of municipal services.

Highlights of the 2025 Operating Budget are as follows:

- Funding for the short-term financing of the Salisbury Fire Rescue Station, including the cost of issuing the debenture in late Fall, pending interest rates and project completion;
- \$150,000 to begin the Town's Residential Development Incentive Program and increase the housing supply in our community;
- Over \$650,000 to contribute to the Town's 2025 Capital Budget, which will include projects such as the construction of a public park space in the Spring Garden subdivision, replacing the culvert at the Reeder Road/Route 106 (Main Street) intersection, and the installation of railings on the railway trestle to increase safety for trail users;
- Increases to all event budgets to continue enhancing event and programming offerings year-round, in addition to increasing the beautification budget for increased holiday lighting at Highland Park.
- The Town will also be participating in a regional waste collection contract with several municipalities in the Southeast, to begin in February of 2025;

In 2025, 1,734 of the properties in the Town of Salisbury are within the provincial "spike protection" mechanism, meaning their property assessment as determined by Service New Brunswick has increased by more than 10% year-over-year to reflect the real and true value of the real estate market.


