The Community of Three Rivers - Search for a Library Location

Since the fall of 2023, the Council of The Community of Three Rivers has been working to find a suitable location for a much-needed Public Library in the community. Recognizing the immense value a library brings to residents; Council has been making efforts to secure a space that meets both the needs of the community and the standards outlined by the New Brunswick Library Board.

"We understand how essential a public library is for our community and are fully committed to bringing this important asset to life for our residents. It's been a continuous process, and work is still actively going on."

In January 2024 Council identified a potential location and was optimistic about moving forward. After an engineering and architectural assessment, it was determined that the property would require extensive renovations and ultimately would not meet requirements for accessibility and adequate space for a vibrant functional library.

The process of establishing a public library can be unfamiliar to many. Municipalities are responsible for securing the physical location, covering associated costs, such as engineering studies, legal fees, and ongoing expenses like heating, hydro, insurance, maintenance, and equipping the building with bookshelves, furniture, and computers etc.

In fulfilling their due diligence, Council stresses the importance of considering every aspect before finalizing a location. Ensuring that every detail, from building requirements to long-term sustainability, is carefully evaluated and remains a top priority. Taxpayers have a right to expect that thorough consideration of all factors are taken into account before committing to an expense of this magnitude.

While Council wishes the process could move more quickly, it's important to understand that multiple steps and requirements must be met before a library can be established.

Despite the setbacks, the Council remains optimistic and determined to find a suitable location. As the process continues, Council remains focused on meeting all necessary requirements and securing a space that will serve the community for generations to come.

A single mom should not end up alone on the street. How does that even happen?

We can grow a little more food in our gardens to share. We can give a listening ear. As a professional or elder you may give some helpful advice to those that ask. We don't need a big house, but we need a roof. We don't need a mountain of food, but we need to eat. Simple onepot meals were once a staple for many families. This skill can easily be taught. All you need is one small heating device and a pot to cook a large or small meal. We can share our favourite, affordable, healthy, budget friendly, simple one-pot meals.

We have to encourage women in the community to see the need to join a women's group. By finding innovative solutions to improve community. We can try to connect with the disconnected, we can create times for social get togethers, and not just meetings. It makes for a strong community bond.

When I heard a well-known politician say "I am going to help women, whether they like it or not", it felt like going back to the ice age. It was a real threat towards women and we should all be worried. Worried about our hard earned freedoms, personal, and professional advancements that are in danger of being taken away.

Together though, we can show our strength. By standing up together and not bowing to the wishes, plans, and power of the rich, we can make a better world for all of us.

Newcomers to our community are probably familiar with a lot of our local volunteer organizations, service clubs like the Lions, Kiwanis, and Legion operate all over Canada and often internationally. The Elgin Eco Park is probably our most visible project, it's a project that at it's start saw people coming together to make a resource for anyone who wishes to use it. The land was donated to the Blueberry Maplefest Committee before they donated it to the EEA, and another section was donated by Mr Nolan. Today there are many people who continue this tradition to maintain and improve the park. Great strides have been made, but maintenance is always needed and we are always improving this place to gather, and share a walk, bike ide, snowshoe, or skate with a friend.

This summer we're excited once again to host weekly evening activities, and as a member of our community, we want to know what you want to do.

A teacher of mine used to say that "a community is a place where everything depends on each other" and by that definition the EEA certainly builds the bonds of community. The EEA helps not only the people of Elgin but also visitors to know they can depend on each other, and through outdoor activities, we experience that the natural environment we live in depends on us just as we depend on it.

I encourage everyone to buy from local vendors as often as possible. I always try to think local first - then provincial, and finally, Canadian. Supporting our local producers isn't just a smart choice for our economy,

March is also the time to celebrate that bridge between International Women's Day on March 8. It's a day to recognize the incredible women who shape our communities past and present. They lead businesses, teach our children, serve as community leaders, and run many of our volunteer organizations and churches. 

of S.L. Stockton and Son, a general merchandise location that had one of the first "lifts" located in the back of the store to move freight and goods from the basement to the store.

The building later became the location of the Royal Canadian Legion replacing the Soldiers Memorial Hall which was demolished in 1969. The Legion building has seen many renovations and additions over the years. In the early years community events run by Legion Branch 41 included a children's play ground, (where the parking lot is across from Foodland), a tennis court, (behind the currant Dollar Store), the Annual County Fair, (in the same parking lot) and the annual Christmas party for children in the community.





the fundraisers that were held to raise money to support returning veterans, the Jordan Home, children's activities, and scholarships for graduating students.

The building is also the location of the Three Rivers Community Museum, founded in 1998. Our museum is home to over 10,000 artefacts from local families, veterans, and visitors from all over the world.

We paused in our walk to pay tribute to the wonderful mural painted on the side of the building, by the well known local artist Fred Harrison. Many memories were shared by those who attended dances and other activities at the Legion over the years. CARROT SOUP

- 2025 Dog Tags for the Town of Salisbury must be purchased by the end of March to avoid paying a late fee. Until then, dog tags are \$10 for spayed or neutered dogs and \$30 if not spayed or neutered. Late fees will boost these rates to \$30 and \$45, respectively, starting April 1.

Please Ensure your Garbage is Accessible

Weekly collection of garbage works best when we as homeowners ensure that the collector can easily and safely access the garbage bags that we place roadside. Please ensure that the bags are accessible and not buried in snow. If they are in a receptacle or bin, ensure that the correct bags are in there. The growing popularity of permanentstyle bins at the ends of driveways has resulted in a few concerns:

- (1) Some residents are treating these bins as personal dumpsters by putting all bags in them each week, regardless of colour. Please ensure that the bags to be collected that particular week are on top and are easily accessible. It is not the collector's job to sort through your bin.
- (2) Ensure that these bins do not fall into disrepair. There have been cases of broken boards and exposed nails, which are a safety hazard for the collector.
- (3) Please keep the bins clean, as they can attract pests. Rats nibbling on bin contents have been reported.

News from Council

Salisbury Town Council meets twice each month for public sessions - on the second Monday evening at 7:00 PM for a Regular Council Meeting and on the evening of the fourth Monday at 6:00 PM for their Committee of the Whole meeting.

The February 10 meeting saw a number of Council decisions made, including:

- Council approved the lease between the Town and the Salisbury Lions Pool for a five-year term. The Town had been operating the Pool since 2022 under a Memorandum of Understanding.

 • Council approved First and Second Readings of four new by-laws for the Town,
- being with respect to: (1) the Prevention of Excessive Noise; (2) Traffic (following revisions focusing on Event Parking); (3) the Operation of All-Terrain Vehicles in Salisbury (which returned to First Reading following significant changes to the original version of the intended by-law); and (4) a fourth by-law to repeal five former Village by-laws deemed no longer applicable or covered by other legislation. These proposed by-laws have been posted for public review at www. salisburynb.ca under Municipal Office>Your Council>By-laws. Meantime, a summary of the changes is posted on the Town website under News and Updates>News.
- Salisbury Town Councillors approved a request from the Salisbury Volunteer Awards Committee for the addition of a sixth award in time for this year's Volunteer Awards event in May. The new award will be for Young Adult Volunteer (aged 18 to 30).

New Deputy Mayor

Nathan O'Blenis is the new Deputy Mayor of the Town of Salisbury. Town Council unanimously approved the nomination of Councillor O'Blenis, an elected representative of Ward 3, at its meeting held on the evening of Monday, February 10, 2025. The nomination put forth by Councillor Stephanie Thorne was seconded by Councillor Phyllis Bannister. Deputy Mayor O'Blenis is currently in his second term as a municipal councillor, first elected to Salisbury Village Council in May of 2021. He takes over his new position from Councillor-at-Large Jason Gallant, who completed his one-year term as Deputy Mayor.
